В.	Da	avid's great SIN against the Lord concerning URIAH, the husband of Bathsheba (11:6-25)	
	1.	David set into motion a plan; whereby he had his general Joab send Bathsheba's to Jerusalem from the battlefield with the Ammonites.	
	2.	The king tried to his sin of adultery by persuading Uriah to go home and spend some " " with his wife Bathsheba, so David broke the 9 th Commandment. (Exodus 20:16)	

	3.	Despite David's insidious efforts, Uriah chose to from relations with his wife while on leave, because he had a desire to remain to the Lord, his comrades and his king.
	4.	In David's carnal mind, this left only one option; so he sent unsuspecting Uriah back to the battle front carrying his own sentence in his hand; thus David broke the 6 th Commandment—"You shall not" (Exodus 20:13) * It is "par for the course" to involve other people in our sinful cover ups; who did David enlist to take part in his?
