## A. Those Paul DISPATCHED and the one who DESERTED him (4:9-13)

#### **B.** The WARNING against Alexander the coppersmith (4:14-15)

- Alexander could have caused Paul "harm" in hindering the spreading of the gospel, but more than likely it was at his \_\_\_\_\_\_ that this damage was inflicted. (4:14a)
  - a. Perhaps Alexander became one of Paul's \_\_\_\_\_\_ before the imperial court.
  - b. It very well could have been Alexander's \_\_\_\_\_\_ that seriously mired the apostle's defense, and any hope for release.
