	A. God Prepares the Gentile Cornelius (10:1-8)			
	1.	Cornelius was a centurion, a Roman in charge of soldiers in the Italian Regiment, consisting of 600 soldiers, he was stationed in Caesarea. (v. 1)		
	2.	For Luke, what was more important than Cornelius's military status was that he was a devout man who feared God; but while he was, he was not, he needed to be born again. (v. 2)		
	3.	At 3:00 pm while praying, an angel appeared to Cornelius and addressed himby (v. 3)		
	4.	Understandably this man was afraid; but after inquiring about the occasion of the visit the angel said that his to and his towards, "have come up for a memorial before God." (v. 4)		
	5.	This Roman was given instructions to send for the Apostle Peter in Joppa, and once the angel departed, Cornelius immediately and sent men at once. (vv. 5-8)		

1.	Even as Cornelius's messengers were on their way to get Peter, at lunchtime the apostle was having a of his own. (vv. 9-10)
2.	In order to prepare Peter, God gave him some preliminary to change his perspective on " and foods," which was a major problem between the Jews and the Gentiles in that day. (vv. 11-12)
3.	The Lord commanded Peter to eat any (or all) of the animals, because there was any distinction with kosher animals. (vv. 13-15)
4.	More importantly, this vision was to teach Peter that there was also no distinction between and; and he was now to go into the home of a Gentile and eat the food set before him. (vv. 16-17a)
5.	While the three men from Cornelius arrived, the Lord told Peter on the roof, that he was to go with them, doubting because they had been (vv. 17b-20)
6.	God's timing is always perfect, Peter was now given the opportunity to the vision from the rooftop; these visitors told him that Cornelius was a (vv. 21-22)
