As seen in v. 13, this new edict basically gave the Jews "the right to," and to defend themselves from their own tyrannical government. (v. 13)
It has often been said that v. 14 is a remarkably convincing illustration of missionary work today. a. Because of entering the world, God's sentence hangs over a fallen humanity.
b. The Lord has also commanded us to the message of salvation to every land. (cf. Matt. 28:18-20; Prov. 24:11)
c. Only a to this message of God's grace through the Lord Jesus' merits can the terrible effects from the first decree of universal condemnation for sin be averted.
