	a.	Since there are many believers who (while poor in this life), will be "heirs of the kingdom", it would be inconsistent for Christians to from them. (v. 5, cf. Matt. 5:3; Luke 6:20)			
		* Is it possible for a believer to be among the poorest in the church financially, but among the wealthiest when it comes to spiritual riches and eternal reward?			
	b.	Instead of favoring Christians, James reminded his readers that the typical of "the rich" to them had been to "" them. (v. 6, cf. Mark 13:9; Acts 4:1-3; 13:50; 16:19; 19:23-41)			
		* Is James suggesting that the rich do not stand a chance in receiving salvation by grace? (Mark 10:20-27; Luke 12:34, Rom. 2:11; Eph. 6:9; Col. 3:25)			
	c.	Apparently the rich in their day believers for their faith in Christ, it would be inconsistent then to show them preferential treatment when they the Lord Jesus. (v. 7)
