## JESUS IS LORD OF THE SABBATH

(Luke 6:1-11)

## I. JESUS' TEACHING REGARDING THE SABBATH (Luke 6:1-11)

A. Je	esus' AUTHORITY over the Sabbath (6:1-5)
1.	The word "Sabbath" means and it is forever linked with God's work of creation coming to an end on the 6 <sup>th</sup> day and He rested on the (Gen. 2:1-3)
	* Why is it problematic to call Sunday the Sabbath?
2.	According to the Law of Moses people who were poor or passing by could of a neighbor's grain, but they could not it. (v. 1, cf. Deut. 23:24-25)
3.	The Pharisees were falsely accusing Jesus' disciples of being in of the Law, but they were not, they were only breaking the Pharisees' regulations. (v. 2)
4.	Jesus' example of David and his men eating the showbread in the tabernacle demonstrated that is the interest of David and his companions were allowed to be the Law with the priest's blessing. (vv. 3-4; cf. Lev. 24:5-9; 1 Sam. 21:1-9)
	* Why did the Scriptures not condemn David's actions?
	Expressing His divine in the statement that He was "Lord of the Sabbath" Christ knew best on how to interpret the Law of Moses on any matter; because He it! (v. 5)

B.	Jesus' KINDNESS and COMPASSION on the Sabbath (6:6-11)		
	1.	Luke recorded two separate events on two separate Sabbaths to reinforce Jesus' authority the Sabbath. (verses 1 & 6)	
	2.	We don't know for certain if the scribes and Pharisees had "planted" the handicapped man in the synagogue, but they were and as if they had. (vv. 6-7)	
	3.	Christ could have healed this man on a different day or in private, but He intentionally chose to do it and purposely Pharisaic traditions. (v. 8)	
	4.	Jesus' attitude toward the Sabbath showed that the mindset of the religious leaders was completely; while they had zeal for ritual and religion, they didn't have for people with genuine needs. (v. 9)	
	5.	Elsewhere Jesus taught that "The Sabbath was made for man, and not man for the Sabbath" (Mark 2:27); and since the Sabbath was for man's, the Jews should be willing to someone in need. (Matt. 12:11-12)	
	6.	Christ did not receive an answer from His critics, so He turned His attention once again to the man with the withered hand and He gave him a to it out. (v. 10)	
		* The Pharisees flew into a rage, but what work had Jesus actually done?	
		* What can you personally apply from this passage?
