B. PRACTICAL APPLICATION

1.	Since church growth begins with the grace of Christ (Eph. 4:7) and ends with the power of Christ (4:16), we need to resist armbar tactics or to motivate and accomplish divine objectives.
2.	If the gifted men are to equip the saints through teaching the Word of God, they need to be of God's Word. (2 Tim. 2:15)
3.	In order to have the freedom to devote his time to study, the congregation must recognize this and the pastor's time by relieving him of duties.
4.	If the saints are equipped to do the work of the ministry, they must avail themselves to face to face teaching on a — unless they are being and themselves, they will run out of spiritual gas in serving the Lord.
5.	The objective in equipping the saints is <u>not</u> to get people busy, but to let God to minister as the need arises; this may be in an or capacity.
6.	When considering someone for a particular ministry, we look for people (faithful, available, and teachable), who are and in that area.
7.	Remember that the key to the (ministry) is the (fellowship with the Lord); otherwise we will have a church full of people simply getting things done in their flesh. (Luke 10:38-42)
8.	Since the of the church and the of Christ are the primary objectives, measure any potential ministry or change by asking, "Will God be glorified and will the church be edified by this?"
